Full Chat

Each November 11th we observe Veterans Day in the U.S. When I was a lad it was Armistice Day while in the UK and Commonwealth they still refer to it as Remembrance Day. The purpose is the same in all locales, to remember the sacrifices of those who served in the 'War to End All Wars' and in the many conflicts that took place before and since.

On the Triumph email list there was a recent discussion on the subject of the correct stamping of commission plates on Triumphs. A straight-forward topic to be sure, but for one of the list members it brought back memories of how it was done 'back in the day'.

John Macartney literally grew up amid Triumphs. His book In the Shadow of my Father – Life at Triumph recounts his father's long career with Standard Motor Company and his own experiences both as a youth and later as an employee of Standard's successor organization Triumph.

John's reply about those commission plates seemed appropriate for repeating this November. I'll let John tell the story in his own words...

John writes:

"Sadly I can't help with sizing issues except to say they weren't always in the same font.

"What I can tell you is all commission plates between about 1946 and 1975 were hand stamped by a small group of five men who were given jobs at Standard-Triumph immediately after World War Two by the then CEO [*Sir John Black*]. I remember all of them (though not now by name) and they were employed because of their horrendous war injuries.

"Two, to my certain knowledge got badly shot up on the beaches on D-Day (6 June 1944) and were seriously disabled. One had been an RAF fighter pilot with indescribable burns and two had had a very rough time in the POW camps in Burma.

"It was an incredibly boring job but they all did it assiduously until some years past retirement age and while the spacing and positioning of the letters and numbers may not have been absolutely precise, they rarely, if ever got it wrong."

A remarkable bit of Brit car history and having heard this, I know I will never again look at one of those plates without thinking about those brave lads and their sacrifice.
